

# **CAT MANAGEMENT IN TASMANIA – TAKING THE INITIATIVE**

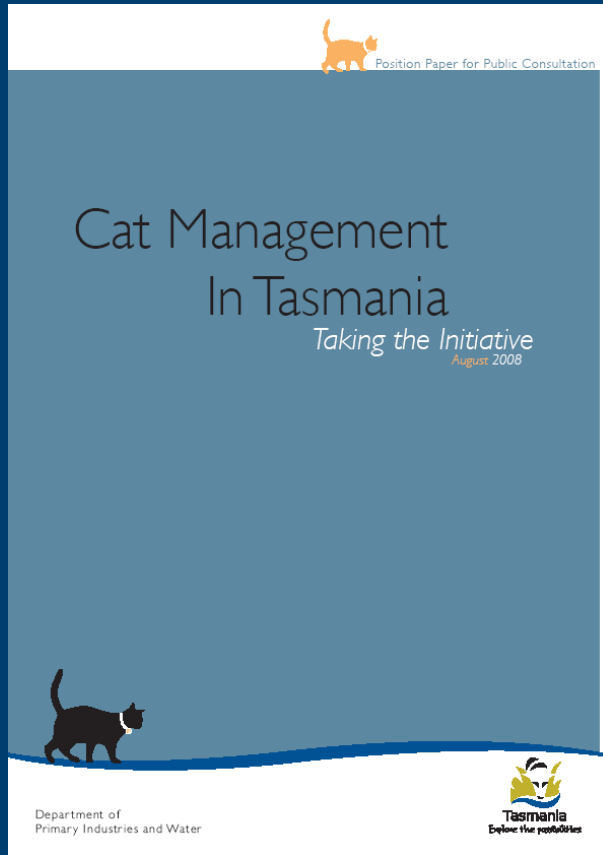
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## BACKGROUND

- ❑ Currently no State-wide, integrated approach to cat management in Tasmania.
- ❑ Tasmanian Government recognised the need to develop a coordinated approach.
- ❑ Developed the Position Paper, *Cat Management in Tasmania – Taking the Initiative*.

# POSITION PAPER



□ Released for public consultation in August 2008.

□ A total of 171 submissions were received.

## OUTCOME OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION

- ❑ 93% of responses supported a legislative approach.
- ❑ Strong support for the main strategies, including:
  - 85% in favour of compulsory micro-chipping;
  - 93% in favour of compulsory de-sexing of non breeding cats; and
  - restrictions on the sale of cats supported by 86%, with 93% in favour of cats being both de-sexed and micro-chipped prior to sale.

## CAT MANAGEMENT LEGISLATION

- ❑ Given this strong support, the Tasmanian Government is progressing with the development of cat management legislation.
- ❑ Proposed legislation is being developed with input from animal welfare organisations, environmental associations, and Local Government.

## PURPOSE

- ❑ With a focus on domestic cats, the proposed legislation would aim to:
  - reduce the number of unwanted cats, and promote responsible ownership, including the de-sexing and micro-chipping of domestic cats;
  - promote the effective management of cats, allowing for the humane handling and management of unidentified, stray and feral cats; and
  - reduce the negative effects on the environment

## KEY ELEMENTS

### □ what is being considered:

- compulsory de-sexing and micro-chipping of domestic cats (phased in over 4 years);
- a register of cat breeders;
- only a cat breeder to be able to breed cats;
- cats to be de-sexed and micro-chipped prior to sale; and
- education on responsible ownership of cats.

## KEY ELEMENTS

- what is being considered:
  - clarifying holding times for cats, and other details, to assist animal welfare shelters and animal holding places.
  - prohibiting cats from certain areas; and
  - enabling Local Government to make by-laws.
